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Adult Community Corrections
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The purpose of the Community Corrections Division is to provide treatment, alternative program options, case management, and other supportive services to adult felony offenders enrolled in Health, Human and Veterans Services-Adult Community Corrections programs so they can lead productive and crime free lives. The Community Corrections Division collaborates with a wide range of criminal justice system practitioners to plan, develop and administer community-based confinement alternatives for adult offenders. The Division works in partnership with criminal justice stakeholders to implement effective programs and services designed to strengthen offender accountability. The Division is the lead agency for the County's implementation of the Michigan Community Corrections Act (Public Act 511); and works with the local Community Corrections Advisory Board to develop Wayne County's Annual Comprehensive Plan.

Through its Comprehension Plan funding, the Division manages and oversees services such as eligibility screening, cognitive learning programs, substance abuse services and alternative housing. The Division manages services designed to increase the availability of treatment options to reduce drunk driving and drunken driving-related injuries and/or fatalities.

Referrals to these programs are received from the Court, the Michigan Department of Corrections, and the Sheriff's Department.

PROGRAM RECOMMENDATION CHART **BASED ON SENTENCING GUIDELINE RANGE AND COMPAS SCORES**

PROGRAM	Eligibility Criteria	CONSIDERATIONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS <i>All sentences to programs must include a probationary term.</i>
Substance Abuse Testing	Current Specialty Court participants or pretrial defendants with an identified and documented substance use need.	Current treatment Court participants (Drug Court, Mental Health Court, Veteran's Court and Swift and Sure Sanctions Program) and pretrial defendants with an identified and documented substance use need.
DWMHA-Black Family Development Detroit Recovery Project	Offenders who fall within moderate to high risk on the Compas criminogenic risk and needs profile.	Current Treatment Court participants or offenders whom have been identified by their Probation Agents as exhibiting signs of behaviors that put them at risk of violating their probation.



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PAGE Jail-Plus	<p>This program targets sentenced felons with 60 days or more remaining on their jail sentence, who score moderate to high in overall risk and/or probable to highly probable on 2 or more of the following need scales;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Criminal Personality • Criminal Thinking • Criminal Involvement • Substance Abuse and/or • Cognitive Behavior <p>on the COMPAS assessment. Also eligible are, probation violators regardless of a COMPAS score.</p>	<p>The 3-Phase Jail-based program (JB3) – this program includes combinations of a jail treatment program, residential substance abuse treatment, community/ outpatient treatment, and/or relapse prevention.</p>
DDJR	<p>The targeted population for this program is felony alcohol dependent, or abusing OUIL offenders (OWI 3rds) with multiple prior convictions and/or multiple probation violations. Offenders must score moderate to high in overall risk potential- OR- moderate to high in substance abuse need on the COMPAS assessment. Offenders will be sentenced to jail or split jail/community corrections sanction.</p>	<p>Drunk Driver Jail Reduction Program –Assessments done at WCJ followed by 14 weeks of outpatient treatment.</p>
WCS Tether	<p>Only Pre-trial or Administrative Jail Releases (AJR)</p>	<p>Supervised release program. Screened and case managed by the WCS Tether Unit.</p>
Domestic Violence Program-Jail and Community based	<p>This program focuses on offenders with a history (multiple episodes) of domestic violence. The current curriculum addresses substance abuse as a co-occurring disorder and has modified the current Batterers curriculum to address the need. Offenders with co-occurring disorders are sentenced to a jail term followed by out-patient treatment. The sentence must include a probationary term. Offenders must be directly sentenced to, or referred to the DVT Program.</p>	<p>12 weeks of jail-based treatment; followed by 26 weeks of outpatient treatment services. May also be directly referred to outpatient.</p>
Community based Trauma Behavioral Therapy	<p>While female probationers are the primary target, male probationers with identified trauma needs are eligible as well. This program is intended to target sentenced felons with a COMPAS score of moderate to high in overall risk and/or probable to highly probable in 2 or more of the following needs scales:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Criminal personality Criminal thinking Criminal involvement Substance abuse and/or Cognitive behavior or <p>Probable to highly probable in 2 or more of any of the gender responsive needs scales Or probation violators regardless of COMPAS score.</p>	<p>This community based trauma cognitive behavioral program will provide offenders with the skills to process and changes in their thought process as it pertains to participating in deviant behaviors, which more than likely will result in criminal changes. By addressing the criminogenic behaviors that led to criminal activity, it is our position that the likelihood of repeated criminal behavior will be reduced, thus reducing the prison commitment rate.</p>



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WRAP Program	Probation violators who have demonstrated new criminal behavior, whether misdemeanor or felony, who may otherwise be considered prison bound. Participants must score moderate to high when using the COMPAS risk assessment.	120 day min. program for Prob. violators with new criminal activity. Administered at the Detroit Reentry Center. Includes both vocational training and cognitive behavioral therapy. Offenders must complete both components.
Fugitive Apprehension Program	Sentenced probationers who abscond from residential facilities; sentenced probationers who engage in prohibited and/or disruptive behavior at a residential facility; probationers who violate the program and/or reporting rules of the Mental Health Court, Veteran's Court, SSSPP, or Drug Court.	Participants of Specialty Court Programs, or sentenced probationers who abscond from residential facilities are eligible for Adult Fugitive Apprehension
